Summer Reading Reflection

Purpose: You will demonstrate your understanding of the summer reading book and reflect on its characterization, theme, and impact.

Instructions: You will write a well-organized, five paragraph essay in response to the book that you chose to read.

Format the essay as follows:

- I. Introduction: Begin with a brief introduction, including the title and author of the book you read. In this paragraph, express the impact that the book has on you as a reader.
- II. Character Analysis: Select a significant character from the book. Describe his/her personal traits, his/her role in the story, and the way in which they contribute to the overall work.
- III. Theme Exploration: Identify a key theme explored in the book. Incorporate a quote from the book that illustrates the theme. Explain how this theme is developed throughout the story.
- IV. Share your personal reaction to the book. Discuss what aspect of the story resonated with you the most and explain why. Reflect on any connections you made between the book and your own life or experiences.
- V. Summarize your overall evaluation of the book, reflecting on the book's relevance and its impact on you as a reader. Consider whether you would recommend this book to others and why.

Formatting Guidelines:

- Use proper formatting (font, size, spacing) and organize your document in a 5 paragraph format.
- Include the page number for the quote that you provide.
- Use clear and concise language, proofread your work, and check for spelling and grammar errors.
- You must use your own words. Copying from other students or any form of technology will result in disciplinary action.

Submission:
