

Phased School Reopening Health and Safety Plan Template

Each school entity must create a Health and Safety Plan which will serve as the local guidelines for all instructional and non- instructional school reopening activities. As with all emergency plans, the Health and Safety Plan developed for each school entity should be tailored to the unique needs of each school and should be created in consultation with local health agencies. Given the dynamic nature of the pandemic, each plan should incorporate enough flexibility to adapt to changing conditions. The templates provided in this toolkit can be used to document a school entity's Health and Safety Plan, with a focus on professional learning and communications, to ensure all stakeholders are fully informed and prepared for a local phased reopening of school facilities. A school entity's Health and Safety Plan must be approved by its governing body and posted on the school entity's publicly available website prior to the reopening of school. School entities should also consider whether the adoption of a new policy or the modification of an existing policy is necessary to effectively implement the Health and Safety Plan.

Each school entity should continue to monitor its Health and Safety Plan throughout the year and update as needed. All revisions should be reviewed and approved by the governing body prior to posting on the school entity's public website.

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This resource draws on a resource created by the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) that is based on official guidance from multiple sources to include: the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the White House, American Academy of Pediatrics, Learning Policy Institute, American Enterprise Institute, Rutgers Graduate School of Education, the World Health Organization, the Office of the Prime Minister of Norway as well as the departments of education/health and/or offices of the governor for Idaho, Montana, New York, Texas and Washington, DC.

Health and Safety Plan: Conwell-Egan Catholic High School

All decision-makers should be mindful that as long as there are cases of COVID-19 in the community, there are no strategies that can completely eliminate transmission risk within a school population. The goal is to keep transmission as low as possible to safely continue school activities. All school activities must be informed by <u>Governor Wolf's Process to Reopen Pennsylvania</u>. The administration has categorized reopening into three broad phases: red, yellow, or green. These designations signal how counties and/or regions may begin easing some restrictions on school, work, congregate settings, and social interactions:

- The Red Phase: Schools remain closed for in-person instruction and all instruction must be provided via remote learning, whether using digital or non-digital platforms. Provisions for student services such as school meal programs should continue. Large gatherings are prohibited.
- The Yellow Phase and Green Phase: Schools may provide in-person instruction after developing a written Health and Safety Plan, to be approved by the local governing body (e.g. board of directors/trustees) and posted on the school entity's publicly available website.

Depending upon the public health conditions in any county within the Commonwealth, there could be additional actions, orders, or guidance provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) and/or the Pennsylvania Department of Health (DOH) designating the county as being in the red, yellow, or green phase. Some counties may not experience a straight path from a red designation, to a yellow, and then a green designation. Instead, cycling back and forth between less restrictive to more restrictive designations may occur as public health indicators improve or worsen. This means that your school entity should account for changing conditions in your local Health and Safety Plan to ensure fluid transition from more to less restrictive conditions in each of the phase requirements as needed.

Pandemic Coordinator/Team

Cleaning, Sanitizing, Disinfecting, and Ventilation

Summary of Responses to Key Questions: Our maintenance and cleaning contract has been revised to add an additional person to provide ongoing cleaning and disinfecting throughout the school day. We will utilize Safety Grant HB1210 and ESSER to purchase cleaning/disinfecting and PPE supplies. Our ventilation systems have been checked and repaired/updated in June 2020. Our maintenance and facilities staff will be trained to use cleaning, sanitizing, disinfecting, and ventilation protocols prior to September 2020.

Social Distancing and Other Safety Protocols

Key Questions

- How will classrooms/learning spaces be organized to mitigate spread?
- How will you group students with staff to limit the number of individuals who come into contact with each other throughout the school day?
- What policies and procedures will govern use of other communal spaces within the school building?
- How will you utilize outdoor space to help meet social distancing needs?
- What hygiene routines will be implemented throughout the school day?
- How will you adjust student transportation to meet social distancing requirements?
- What visitor and volunteer policies will you implement to mitigate spread?
- Will any of these social distancing and other safety protocols differ based on age and/or grade ranges?
- Which stakeholders will be trained on social distancing and other safety protocols? When and how will the training be provided? How will preparedness to implement as a result of the training be measured?

Summary of Responses to Key Questions: Since we will be transitioning to an A/B schedule, we will only have half of our student population in the building at one time. Classrooms will accommodate up to 17 students per class (half the maximum class size) with 6 feet between desks. Grade levels will be designated to specific classrooms, which will minimize the number of rooms and areas of the building that students will be traveling to/from. We will use individual student desks in the cafeteria with 6 feet between desks for lunches and study halls. The gymnasium will also be set up with individual student desks (6' apart) to accommodate larger groups and excessive teacher absences, if needed. Visitors will only enter the main lobby of the building where they'll be greeted by a staff member. Non-employees or essential personnel will only enter the building beyond the main lobby in an emergency situation. We believe ongoing communication throughout the summer months, in addition to a transition process at the beginning of the school with limited numbers of students, will help parents, students, faculty, and staff understand and adjust to the safety these guidelines.

Monitoring Student and Staff Health

- What is the policy for quarantine or isolation if a staff, student, or other member of the school community becomes ill or has been exposed to an individual confirmed positive for COVID-19?
- Which staff will be responsible for making decisions regarding quarantine or isolation requirements of staff or students?
- What conditions will a staff or student confirmed to have COVID-19 need to meet to safely return to school? How will you accommodate staff who are unable to uncomfortable to return?
- How will you determine which students are willing/able to return? How will you accommodate students who are unable or uncomfortable to return?

- Which stakeholders will be trained on protocols for monitoring student and staff health? When and how will the training be provided? How will preparedness to implement as a result of the training be measured?

Summary of Responses to Key Questions: Parents will be advised to monitor their children for signs of illness prior to sending them to school daily. All students will have their temperature checked upon entering the building daily. Only one entrance will be used for all students (bus riders, drivers, and drop-offs). Any students reading a temperature above 100.4 degrees will be sent home for the day. Faculty and staff members will be encouraged to stay home if they are not feeling well or have a temperature above 100.4 degrees. Quarantining or isolation decisions, as well as accommodating students and staff members unable or uncomfortable to return, will be made in conjunction with the Office of Catholic Education. Parents will be notified of any pertinent and appropriate information via email from the principal on an ongoing basis.

Summary of Responses to Key Questions: All students will be required to wear masks aside from when they're seated at their desk for lunch. All faculty and staff will be required to wear a mask or face shield. In the event of staff illness, additional non-teaching staff will be utilized. CEC is fortunate to have 4 full-time counselors (1 per grade, 115:1 student to counselor ratio) to help support social emotional wellness.

Individual student desks will be used with 6+ feet of space between desks all facing in the same direction. Clear walking paths will be identified. Students will wear masks when not seated.
- Communication regarding best practices will be sent out to parents, students, Faculty, and Staff throughout the summer. Signs will be posted throughout the school building, particularly in the bathrooms.
- Signs will be posted throughout the school building.

Limiting the sharing of materials among students

Staggering the use of communal spaces and hallways

Adjusting transportation schedules and practices to create social distance between students

Limiting the number of individuals in classrooms and other learning spaces, and interactions between groups of students

Coordinating with local childcare regarding on site care, transportation protocol changes and, when possible, revised hours of operation or modified school-year calendars

Other social distancing and safety practices

- Physical Education classes are being pushed to the second semester. All students enrolled in Health/PE will have Health for semester one.
- CEC is a 1:1 device school. Students will not be permitted to share devices. Computer labs will not be utilized. Online textbooks will be encouraged for all classes.
- Grade levels will be stationed in specific areas of the building in classroom clusters. All hallways and stairwells will be one-way with signage/arrows posted. With only 230 students in the building at one time and limited movement between classes, hallways should not be congested or a safety concern.
- CEC will follow guidelines set by feeder districts that provide transportation. Carpooling is discouraged.
 Social distancing rules will be followed when contracting out for transportation.
- We will operate on an A/B schedule with a maximum class size of 17 students. The suggested 6 feet of space between desks will be observed. Grade levels will be assigned to specific classroom clusters to minimize interactions between groups of students.

Monitoring Student and Staff Health

Requirement(s)

- * Monitoring students and staff for symptoms and history of exposure
- * Isolating or quarantining students, staff, or visitors if they become sick or demonstrate a history of exposure
- * Returning isolated or quarantined staff, students, or visitors to school

Strategies, Policies and Procedures

- All students and staff should check their symptoms prior to leaving their homes daily. All student temperatures will be checked upon entrance daily. All faculty and staff will be encouraged to report students who show signs of illness to the nurse and school administration.
- Rooms 101 and 103 will be used to isolate individuals who show signs of illness so they are separated from the rest of the school population. This location is near the main entrance and exit of the building.
- Students or staff who test positive for COVID-19 with symptoms may return after 3 days with no fever; and respiratory
